Artist and Company Bios:

Almazônica

Almazônica is a new dance collective which promotes the rich cultural roots of Brazilian dance and music through performances, classes and community events.

Felice Gomez has been studying Afro-Brazilian culture and arts, including capoeira, samba and folkloric dances since 1998 in both the Bay Area and Brazil. Felice has studied most significantly under her mentor, Tania Santiago. She has performed with Tania's Aguas Dance Company for almost 15 years. Felice has also performed with Paco Gomes & Dancers, Ginga Brasil/Damasceno Dance Collective, Las Que Son Son, Amor do Samba, Capacitor Modern Dance, Olodum for their San Francisco show, and as a guest for Alayo Dance Company's Cuban cabaret show, "Explosion Cubana."

Amor Do Samba

Amor do Samba Entertainment is a San Francisco based samba dance and music ensemble dedicated to promoting Afro-Latin culture through the performing arts. Celebrating samba, sights and sounds on stage, we uniquely specialize in Brazilian themed productions & events. Amor do Samba curates latin themed entertainment for the tech sector (Google. Yahoo, Genentech), and sporting events (Superbowl City, Stanford Stadium). We bring high - energy samba dance shows with live percussionists and bands and are the dance company who has performed for diplomats representing over 23 countries, including the Brazilian consulate. Tanilee Amor is founder and artistic director of Amor Do Samba, a samba dance entertainment company established in 2011 and performing across the Americas and Africa. Tanilee studied dance at UCLA (Cum Laude) with a specialization in Afro - Latin dance and art as a social change agent. She continued her dance studies in Brazil, Peru, Colombia, Mexico and Belize and has dedicated a life time to the performing arts, first and foremost as a student, dancer, costume designer, and choreographer, as well as behind the scenes in arts administration and management for the UCLA Center for Performing Arts, San Francisco Ethnic Dance Festival and Mission Cultural Center for Latino Arts.

Arenas Dance Company

Arenas Dance Company is an all-female ensemble of dancers and percussionists directed by Susana Arenas Pedroso. The ensemble

has performed at the Black Choregraphers Festival, the Cuba Caribe Festival, Salsa Rueda Festival, Yemanja Festival, Stanford Jazz Festival, Ethnic Dance Festival and San José Jazz Festival., and at venues such as Yerba Buena, Herbst Theater, Stanford University, the University of California at Berkeley and Davis, Chico State, The Great American Music Hall, and La Peña Cultural Center. In 2005 it produced the evening length show Yo Soy Cuba (I am Cuba) in San Francisco. By popular demand the music and dance extravaganza was remounted in 2006 for four encore performances.

Susana Arenas Pedroso Born and raised in Havana, Cuba, Susana Arenas Pedroso began her career in dance at age twelve, studying at La Casa de Cultura de Matanzas and at Cojunto Folklorico Nacional in Havana. She danced professionally for seventeen years in Cuba with popular, folkloric and theatrical performing groups, including Tierra Virgen, Alafia Ire, Oche Olorun, Oriki, Clave y Guaguancó, Oba Wemilere, Rumberos de Cuba, and Raíces Profundas. Since her arrival in the United States in 1998, Susana has performed and choreographed numerous pieces that have been exhibited throughout the United States, Austria, Mexico, Morocco, Martinique, Cuba and Hong Kong with companies such as Omo Ache, Omo Oddara, Ban Rarra, Ire Ile, Alayo Dance Company, Las Que Son Son and Obini Ashe. In 1999 Ms Pedroso founded her own dance companies, Saudunga Cubana, which specialized in Cuban Popular dance, and Olorun, which specialized in Cuban Folkloric dance. In 2004 Ms Pedroso joined the two troupes into one, establishing Arenas Dance Company, an all-female ensemble that has developed an expertise in folkloric and popular Cuban rhythms and traditions.

Gladys "Bobi" Céspedes

is an acclaimed folkloric singer, dancer, percussionist, recording artist, theatrical director, storyteller, priestess and Iyanifa, accomplished historian, lecturer, and cultural arts teacher. She sings in three languages: English, Spanish, and Lucumi, the mother tongue of the descendants of the Yorubas of West Africa in Cuba. She makes and plays a variety of authentic folkloric percussion instruments, including the Chekere. She was the youngest of 14 children into a musical family on the outskirts of Havana, Cuba. In 1959 she moved to New York City where she continued to study with such notable artists as Sylvia del Villar, the world-renowned African-Puerto Rican vocalist and West African folklorist Baba Denizulu. She directed and performed in several Afro-Cuban troupes in the New York Area. In 1981, Bobi, her brother Luis and nephew Guillermo formed the original son trio, called Trio Cespedes. Trio Cespedes later grew into

Conjunto Cespedes. Bobi has performed nationally and internationally at Bill Graham's World Beat Festival, the BAM Festival in Barcelona, the Kentucky Center for the Arts, the Smithsonian Museum in Washington, D. C., SOBs and Joe's Pub in NYC. Bobi has opened for countless acts, including Tito Puente, Ruben Blades and El Gran Combo. She also worked with Mickey Hart's Planet Drum and Bembe Orisha and Since 2003 Bobi has led her own band, and recorded two albums Rezos on 6 Degree Records, and Patakin on VL Sounds. In the rich field of Cuban music, Bobi Céspedes stands out as a gem and can rightfully be considered one of our national cultural treasures.

Bolivia Corazón de América

Bolivia Corazón de America was founded in 2000 by Susana Salinas, an immigrant from Bolivia, with a mission to give Bolivian American children a place to learn about their culture. Today the company includes dancers of all backgrounds. The company educates audiences through innovative high-quality professional performances. Bolivia Corazón de América often recreates dances by taking innovative approaches to ancient and rare forms.

Isidro Fajardo Isidro Fajardo is an immigrant from Mexico. His work with the company pans the last ten years. Not having much formal training, the work created for Bolivia Corazón de America is based on independent research about Bolivia's culture, customs, and traditions. Isidro attended UC Santa Cruz for his undergraduate degree and received a minor in dance. Isidro has choreographed multiple works, many of which have been part of the renowned San Francisco Ethnic Dance Festival, the Chinese Touring Festival in Beijing, World City in Los Angeles, and other cultural and community events.

Cuicacalli Dance Company

Cuicacalli meaning 'House of Culture' in Nahuatl language, is a dance company based in San Francisco, California, founded and directed by Mexican native, Jesus Jacoh Cortes. Inspired by cultural traditions and their development to the modern days, Cuicacalli develops choreographies to revive traditions, social and environmental situations, or simply give a look to the daily life with an abstract motion. Cuicacalli is a multi disciplinary dance company that fuse various styles into a unique story of their own. By including dance styles such as Indigenious, Folkloric, Contemporary, Cuicacalli hopes to expose, sustain, and expand traditional and modern dancing with a new lens.

Jesus Cortes Jesús "JACOH" Cortés, began his training in Mexican folk dance when he was 6 years old under the direction of his great

uncle Juan Natoli. In 2000, he started dancing with Ballet Folklórico de Mexico de Amalia Hernandez in the Palace of Fine Arts in Mexico City after he was trained as a Deer Dancer under the direction of Lucas Zarate Lobato. He was a soloist in the role of The Deer Dance "La Danza Del Venado" for Ballet Folklorico de Mexico de Amalia Hernandez he has toured in Mexico, Europe and the US. Currently, he lives in San Francisco and works as an artist in residence with the SFUSD. He is a lead teacher and choreographer for Dancing Earth and is Founder and Artistic Director of Cuicacalli Escuela de Danza (meaning house of culture in nahuatl dialect). In 2012 Mr. Cortes premiere Cuicacalli Dance Company. In the last 4th years he has developed three works: "Raices sin limites" (Endless roots) "500 Years of Resistence" and "Cicatrices" (Scars).

Cunamacué

Cunamacué, an Oakland based music and dance company whose mission is to promote the continuity of Afro-Peruvian culture representing it not as a point in time but as a living, vibrant and evolving form whose music and dance can be used as a means of expression. Adapting to its new environment, the San Francisco Bay Area, Cunamacué uses Afro-Peruvian movement vocabulary as well as movements inspired by modern dance and dances of the African Diaspora.

Cunamacué has performed locally and in Peru having had the pleasure to collaborate with local and international artists to create original compositions in both music and dance.

Carmen Román was raised both in Lima, Peru, and in the Bay Area. She is a dancer, choreographer, educator, filmmaker, and emerging scholar. Carmen is the founder and Artistic Director of Cunamacué, an Oakland based music and dance company dedicated to the promotion and continuity of Afro-Peruvian culture. Her choreographies have been presented both locally and internationally. Her first film, Herencia de Un Pueblo, was awarded Best Documentary and Best Cinematography at the San Francisco Dance Film Festival. Carmen has published Dance research in the African Performance Review. She recently completed a U.S. Fulbright Fellowship in Dance to Peru where she conducted research on Afro-Peruvian Dance through performance, observation, teaching, and living in the community.

Dimensions Extensions Performance Ensemble & Batala San Francisco

DEPE continues Dimensions Dance Theater's artistic legacy of presenting the African American experience through the dance, music and songs of the African diaspora. Led by dancer/choreographer Latanya D. Tigner, dancers are trained in jazz, modern, hip hop, Haitian, ballet and African movement. Since 1994, they have served the community through various performances throughout the bay area and beyond.

Latanya D. Tigner, choreographer, has performed professionally with Dimensions Dance Theater since 1986, and has studied and toured nationally and internationally. She holds a B.A. in Physical Education/ Dance, a M.A. in Arts Administration, directs Dimensions' youth company, and currently teaches dance at Contra Costa College and UC Berkeley.

Beginning in 2013 BSF began collaborating with Rite of Passage (ROP)/ Dimensions Extensions Performance Ensemble (DEPE)—an educational outreach program serving youth aged 8–18 years. Eight youth dancers will join Batalá SF drummers to perform our collaborate piece,

Batala San Francisco Batalá San Francisco is a community band that plays samba reggae, an Afro-Brazilian genre of music developed in Bahia, Brazil. Founded in 2012, it is comprised of forty drummers and has quickly developed a reputation for excellence.

Sonia D. Pina, Musical Director, Batalá San Francisco, Born in Havana, Cuba, she is daughter of a professional musician and studied at music conservatories starting at a young age. After immigrating to the U.S., she continued to study percussion. She's currently the Festival Producer for CubaCaribe, and the Production Assistant for World Arts West. **Deborah Valoma**, Artistic Director/Co-Founder, Batalá San Francisco, is an artist, professor, and chair of the Textiles Program at California College of the Arts. She is a trained dancer with over ten years of experience with Bay Area ethnic dance companies. She is responsible for all visual arts for Batala, for teaching choreography and refining movement and styling.

Los Lupeños de San José

Founded in 1969 by visionaries Susan Cashion and Ramón Morones, Los Lupeños de San José is recognized as one of the earliest Mexican folk dance companies in California. Los Lupeños is known for its artistry, history, traditions, innovation, and endurance. Los Lupeños artists are passionate about learning and executing their art form, representing their culture, and being a positive force within the California dance community. As a program of the Cashion Cultural Legacy since 2014, Los Lupeños is re-establishing itself at the forefront of the folklórico dance genre under the artistic direction of choreographer Samuel Cortez.

Samuel Cortez Artistic Director Samuel Cortez, originally from Cela-

ya, Guanajuato, México has been teaching folklórico dance all over the United States for the last 17 years. Since January, 2015 he has led both the Performing Company of renowned Grupo Folklórico Los Lupeños de San José whose home base for rehearsals, public classes, and performances is the School of Arts and Culture at the Mexican Heritage Plaza in San José. Performers are volunteers and the passion for their culture keeps them dancing in the group, sometimes for more than 25 years! Los Lupeños performs traditional folk dance. Even though it is staged for performance needs, the essence of the regional traditions are preserved.

Maracatu Pacífico

Maracatu Baque Virado or Maracatu Nação (Nation) is a folkloric tradition with African roots from the state of Pernambuco, Brazil. Maracatu Pacífico is a community-based performance group in Oakland, formed in late 2012 under leadership of Eric Hoffman as an evolution of Maracatu Luta (2006-2012) with an emphasis on community and personal development through study and performance. As a diverse group united by passion for these rhythms, players learn traditional Maracatu instruments and dancers perform traditional movements. Their repertoire draws from traditional Maracatu Nações and more modern, non-traditional groups like Maracatu Badia and Maracatu Nação Pernambuco. They gratefully acknowledge these groups and their mestres for keeping this rich, powerful culture alive. Maracatu Pacífico strives to maintain the utmost respect for this culture, and members continually work to deepen and improve their representation.

Elisa Chaves Native of Rio de Janeiro, Brazil. She has danced and studied Maracatu since 2008. She is passionate about it and its interconnection of dance, music, and spirituality, and its meaning for Afro-Brazilian traditions. In addition, she is also a tango dancer and has a degree in contemporary dance through the Angel Vianna School of Dance in Rio de Janeiro. Elisa has taught dance regularly in the Bay Area since she moved to the US in 2013. When Elisa is not dancing, she works with children and families as a social worker in a non-profit in SF.

Eric Hoffman moved from the East Coast to California in 2001, began studying Brazilian dance and percussion in 2002, playing with Jorge Alabe's Grupo Samba Rio since its' inception. After studying in Brazil and with Brazilian teachers touring the US, Eric started directing Maracatu Pacífico in late 2012 with the goal of fostering and sharing the maracatu tradition here in the Bay area. He does computer programming for a hospital in Boston when he's not behind a drum or whistle.

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
