Ayiti Pap Mouri!

Aviti Pap Mouri! (Haiti will not die) weaves the political, social, historical and cultural aspects of Haiti into the story of a young woman, Ayiti. She was tragically hurt by three jealous women: "Colonization," "Politics," and "Catastrophe," after she captured the love and attention of Kouzin Zaka (the lwa, or deity, of agriculture). A Mambo and a Wonsi (a fully-initiated member of the ritual chorus) come to rescue her by bringing her on a spiritual journey where they go to ask Papa Legba to open the gate for her and plead for justice. During this journey she meets Papa Ogou, a lwa of battle, who reconnects her with her African heritage. She then enters the universe of Bawon Samedi and the quédés where she dies and is triumphantly reborn a stronger woman.

Ramón Ramos Alayo is a dancer, teacher, choreographer and the founder and artistic director of Alayo Dance Company and of CubaCaribe. Selected by the Cuban government to study dance in Santiago de Cuba at age eleven, he went on to earn a masters degree in contemporary and folkloric dance and dance education from Havana's National School of Art.

He was the principal dancer with Danza del Caribe, Narciso Medina Contemporary Dance Company and performed in Cuba, Europe, Canada, Belize and the U.S. Since moving to California in 1997, he has performed with some of the most respected choreographers in the San Francisco Bay Area, including Robert Henry Johnson, Kim Epifano, Sara Shelton Mann, and Joanna Haigood. Ramos currently dances with Robert Moses' Kin and teaches Cuban popular dance, Afro-Cuban modern dance and children's movement at several local dance studios and schools.

In 2002, he founded Alayo Dance Company. As director and choreographer, his work is an innovative fusion of Afro-Cuban modern, folkloric and popular Cuban dance. Ramos has choreographed and produced eight full-length dance performances: Añoranza de Una Epoca (1999); Mis Sueños, Mis Ideas (2003, 2004); A Piece of White Cloth (2004, 2005); La Madre (2005); After Rain (2006); Three Threes & Traces (2007); Blood and Sugar (2008); and Migrations (2010).
